#### A. Abstract:

The title of my paper is *Childhood Obesity: The Rapid Growing Epidemic* and the title of my project is <u>Homers for Childhood Obesity</u>. I chose childhood obesity as my topic because my little brother is overweight and I am very passionate about this topic. My whole family is "big" and I'm curious is being "big" runs in your genes or if it is caused by your lifestyle, or both. My driving questions for my research are:

- 1) What exactly is obesity and the other stages?
- 2) What are the long term effects of being a child who is obese or overweight?
- 3) Is childhood obesity caused by nature or nurture (meaning are you born to be that way or are you raised to be that way)?
- 4) What can people do to prevent childhood obesity?

The law aspect that I am going to be looking into is whether or not it is the mother's fault or not. I am basically going to look at nature vs. nurture. I've seen court cases where the kids are taken away from their mothers for their kids being obese.

My consultant for my project will be Mr. Winn. For my project, I am thinking of doing a homerun derby for girls 12-18 years old. The winner (whoever hits the most homeruns in each age group, 12-14 and 15-18) will win a bat that I will purchase for the event. There will be different "fences" designed so that the competition is fair for the different age groups. There will be a 10 dollar admission fee per person and each girl that comes can either bring a tosser or chose the designated tosser (Tim Johnston) to toss for them. Tim Johnston is one of the coaches for the FC softball team and will gladly toss for whoever wants him to. Each girl will get a total of 10 swings, not 10 balls, meaning she

could have 20 balls pitched to her, but she can only swing ten times. This homerun derby will take place at FC's softball field. I am captain of the varsity softball team so I have access to the field whenever I need to with Butler's consent.

I will get people to come to my event by advertising on my travel teams website, putting a flier up at Grand Slam, sending out group texts to all of the softball girls that I have played with, and by advertising around the school. The purpose of this project is to raise funds to be donated to childhood obesity. To Start the derby off, I will speak about childhood obesity and why I am conducting a derby.

Also for my project, I am looking at making tee-shirts with *Homers for Childhood Obesity* on the front of the tee shirts. I will charge the participants \$10.00 for the tee-shirts, that way I can make profit which will be donated to the *Alliance for a Healthier Generation* foundation. I will also set up a donation jar at Grand Slam for people to donate money towards my project.

The *Alliance for a Healthier Generation* foundation is a catalyst for children's health. They work with schools, community organizations, companies, healthcare professionals and families to transform the conditions and systems that lead to healthier kids. Their primary goal is to reduce the prevalence of childhood obesity and to empower kids to develop lifelong, healthy habits. The most local group is located in Washington, D.C..

I'm thinking of having the people who attend my homerun derby evaluate my project based on their experience and the organization of the event. Also I could create a survey for parents to fill out based on observations.
